Introduction

The Internet contains vast amounts of information and it can be difficult to know where to start when looking for information on a specific topic. This guide is intended to be a starting point if you are interested in gardening and would like to find out what resources are available on the Internet.

Sites are selected which help with planning a garden, choosing plants and buying them online. The sites chosen are reputable, up-to-date and the advice is given in an easy-to-read and easy-to-navigate format. The majority of the sites used are based in Ireland or the UK, as the advice given or plants sold on these sites suit our climate. The location of a website also has implications when it comes to buying online as it can affect delivery areas and delivery costs. Shopping online can offer a greater variety than you may find locally. Buying online is not possible on all of the websites, however, the websites are also useful as a source of information on the latest products available.

Online gardening clubs/bulletin boards/forums are one area where the Internet offers a unique service – gardeners can share their knowledge and experience and get help with problems from others easily over the Internet.

The listing of additional websites at the end of the guide gives an indication of the amount of information on all aspects of gardening and the number of gardening organisations who have a presence on the Internet.

Need to know

A basic familiarity with a computer and the Internet is required.

Need to have

Access to a PC

For online ordering:

- a credit card (if you intend to order online)
- an email address
- a delivery address where goods can be accepted during working hours.

Quick guide

The guide works its way from the planning and design aspects of your garden to choosing suitable plants for it. Having chosen the plants, there are a number of websites where plants, seeds, bulbs, lawn seed, roses and shrubs can be purchased online. In the "gardening for produce" section there are links to websites where you can buy vegetable seeds and plants, fruit trees, herb plants, pears and apple trees, cherry trees and organic seeds.

There are also links to websites with further information and advice on gardening as well as an online gardening club. Finally, there are links to online gardening bulletin boards and forums.

At the end of the guide there are links to additional websites, covering commercial sites, advice sites, and sites on gardens to visit.

Step-by-Step Guide

Gardening for pleasure

Planning and designing your garden

When planning a new garden or improving an existing garden, there are a number of basic things which will affect the design:

- Site aspect, space, time and cost
- Who will use the garden? Children, pets, older generation, disabled users, etc.
- How you use the garden? Do you want beds full of colourful plants, grass on which to play football with children, an outdoor entertaining area or a combination of all of the above?
- The amount of time available to maintain the garden also influences choice of layout and plants.

www.garden.ie has an excellent section on garden design. Click on the link **garden design** on the left hand side of the screen.

Under each aspect of garden design there are different subsections, e.g. town gardens, large front gardens, non-plant features, etc.

This is an American website so all of the books recommended may not always be available to purchase in Ireland – however they may be available to purchase online.

Choosing plants

When choosing plants the following are the main considerations: light, moisture, temperature, wind, soil type. Choose plants which suit your conditions. Some plants called 'hardy plants' will thrive pretty much anywhere. However, 'tender' plants need more care and attention. It is good to have different points of interest in a garden. Choosing plants which flower at different times of the year, or plants with coloured foliage or whose foliage changes colour, will help achieve this.

Click on **Know your plot**. There is a list of plants suitable for each soil type under this section. Choose the type of plant you want from the **Plant Lists** section on the right-hand side of the screen.

Buying plants

Once you have decided what plants you want in your garden, it is possible to buy them online. When ordering online remember:

- companies may not deliver plants outside the country in which the
 website is based as there are restrictions on sending rooted items. Check
 in the terms and conditions page before ordering
- generally bulbs and seeds can be sent worldwide always check delivery charges
- some companies have a minimum order quantity or minimum order value.

When buying online, also remember that the items available are influenced by the season i.e. bulbs will be available to buy at the time of year they should be planted.

Plants, Seeds, Bulbs

There are many interesting and useful sites that allow you to buy plants, seeds and bulbs online. One such example, www.mrmiddleton.com, is a one stop shop as they have plants, seeds, bulbs and plants available and is based in Dublin. Orders can be placed online.



Seeds – you can order seeds from the above website or through Thompson Morgan direct using www.seeds.thompson-morgan.com Click on **Online Seed Catalogue** – **Worldwide Delivery** – then select **Ireland** from the drop down list

There is a **SEARCH Flowers** link on the left hand side of the page. On this you can search by plant type or by area where you wish to plant, e.g. bedding, borders, etc.

Bulbs

Langeveld do not sell online to the general public but this website gives great information on what is available

Tulips

Lawns

Decide how it will be used. Is it ornamental or multi functional – the grass seeds or turf chosen should reflect the use(s) of the lawn. The amount of time available to maintain the lawn will influence the lawn size.

Bulletin boards/Forums

Plant finder

Seeking information on a specific plant for a specific place in the garden? e.g. an evergreen plant for a shady spot in the garden?

Use **plant finder** www.bbc.co.uk/gardening/plants/plant_finder/index.shtml which brings you to the search page. Enter the details of the type of plant you want in each search field. The more specific your request, the shorter the result list will be. However, It is best not to restrict your search too much by making a selection in each field as you may not get any results. A more specific choice can be made from the list displayed after the initial search.

Glossary

Bulletin Board: An interactive section found in some websites that

permits individuals to post online comments on a topic. Each bulletin board is usually based on a particular theme or topic (e.g. discussion group on a particular

author, news story, sport).

Drop-down menu: A list of choices that appears when you click on a word

or hold your pointer over the word.

Email: Email or electronic mail is a service that sends messages

across the Internet from one human user to another. Like a letter, email is person-to-person and it stores

messages until they are read.

FAQ's: (Frequently Asked Questions)

A FAQ is a list of questions and their answers, which are commonly asked. These are published on the website of a product or service, so that the same question is not asked of the supplier, over and over again. A good example of a FAQ, which focuses on web security, is at http://www.w3org./Security/Faq/www-security-faq.html

Forum: A space where individuals may exchange views online.

Homepage: The main or introductory page of a website.

Internet: A large collection of computers, connected together

to allow them to share information with one another.

Interactive Site: A site where you can post comments, remarks,

questions, and receive replies from other users.

Link: A link, or hyperlink, is a part of a web page that,

if clicked with a mouse, opens a different web page. Links are usually shown in blue and underlined on

a webpage.

Online: A word used as shorthand for 'on the Internet'

or 'connected to the Internet'

Register:

To register means to create an identity online. For many services, it is important that the website knows your name, address, phone number, etc. For example, if buying a book in an online bookshop, you need to provide this information. The online bookshop then records your details in a database of customers, which it later uses to post out the book to you. Registration is usually completed by filling in an online form, with fields for name, address and other information.

Website:

A website is a collection of web pages which displays information on a particular topic. Common types of websites include company websites (information about the company), online shops (where you buy goods and services and pay by credit card) and personal websites (where individuals share their interests). A website may consist of just one page of information, but will usually contain several pages, all linked together. All the pages in a website usually share the same 'domain' name. For example, all the pages in the large online shop Amazon have an address (URL) that starts with 'www.amazon.com'.
